# Japan

Japanese children must help at home and school from an early age. From the age of five, they help with loading the

washing machine and folding clothes. At school, all students have to clean their classrooms at the end of the day by sweeping the floor, dusting the shelves and desks and taking out the rubbish. If children, even very young children, need to use public transport to get to and from school, then they travel alone.



# USA

Children in the USA don't have to help at home often. A recent study showed that they don't do more than 30 minutes of housework a day. The jobs that they do most frequently include making the bed, tidying their room and putting clothes away.



# Kenya

In Kenya, most children mustn't leave home for school until they have tidied their bedrooms. In the evenings, children help at home at mealtimes by laying the table and washing the dishes. They also often have to do other jobs such as watering the plants or taking out the rubbish.

# That sounds familiar!

Storytellers have known for years that the same types of stories are regularly repeated, but nobody could agree on how many basic story types existed. Some guessed there were five, while others said there were as many as nine. Now a university professor has <sup>1</sup>\_\_\_\_\_\_\_. # A Rags to riches

Then they made bad decisions or had bad luck and things started to go wrong. At the end, the main character has lost everything and we're crying with them!

## C Tragedy, part 1

Then, we sit and watch as they lose everything as quickly as they found it. Why do they lose it? Perhaps they found success in a bad way or they didn't realise how lucky they'd been, and they had wanted more and more. As a result, life punished them!

#### D Tragedy, part 2

In some ways, Tragedy part 2 is crueller than part 1! Life was <sup>5</sup>\_\_\_\_\_\_ for the main character, but usually because of the mistakes they had made in the past, problems soon appeared and changed all that. However, after these first problems, their situation improved again and they started to believe that all their problems were finally behind them. Unfortunately, that's their biggest mistake, as life gets a lot worse and the story <sup>6</sup>\_\_\_\_\_\_\_ ... very badly for them!

#### E Cinderella syndrome

The main character is a good person who began the story in a <sup>7</sup>\_\_\_\_\_ with lots of difficulties, usually because they were poor and the people around them had been mean or cruel. Then, something happened to give them hope, but as things were <sup>8</sup>\_\_\_\_\_, more problems came. In the end, however, hope wins, their dream becomes true and the main character lives happily ever after.

# F Meeting the challenge

Our hero is an ordinary person who was happy with their ordinary life, but one day everything suddenly changed when a big problem appeared. However, the main character <sup>9</sup>\_\_\_\_\_\_ and faced the problem. The story ends with our hero returning to their normal life, but they are now a better person thanks to their experience.

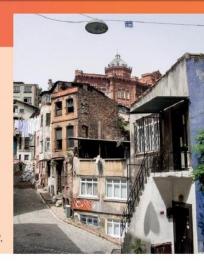

# Animal social groups

It is common for these animals to have three social groups, as shown in the diagram. The 'wider group', which often has around fifty members, gives all the animals protection against predators. The next 'secondary



group', which might contain around fifteen members, regularly socialise together and also co-operate with each other when hunting for food. However, animals in large social groups often have up to five close friends, who they look out for and turn to for protection when they fall out with other members of the larger group. This is their 'primary group'.

Research done by Shark Bay Dolphin Research in Australia has found that male dolphins form primary friendship groups with one or two male friends who are not family, and these friendships can last a lifetime. These dolphins hold fins as they swim and copy their friends when they play. In humans, copying can increase trust and perhaps it has the same effect for dolphins. Most unusually, these dolphins also have unique whistles which they use to call their close friends, just like human names. So it seems we have lots more in common with these animals than we first thought.

# Good friends, good science

Have you ever thought what's so great about your friends and why you hang out with the people you do? I've been reading a lot of great stuff online recently that shows that science can answer some of these questions.

<sup>1</sup> They are the people we go for a coffee or to the cinema with, they make us laugh when we feel like crying, they help us with our homework and when things go wrong. But did you know that research has shown that having friends is also good for our health?

In fact, people who spend time with their good friends have stronger immune systems, which means they are less likely to get sick and will recover more quickly from an illness. They can also help reduce how stressed we feel because spending time with friends decreases the level of cortisol, a hormone that increases stress in our bodies.

<sup>2</sup>\_\_\_\_ It's exam time and I haven't been hanging out with my friends so much!

Have you ever wondered why you get on with some people better than others? Science has an answer for that as well. Generally people think that we are more likely to make friends with people who we have things in common with, but I was surprised to find out that this isn't only about being into the same TV shows, bands or sports.

<sup>3</sup>\_\_\_ In reality, they are similar to the genes of people who have the same great-great-great-grandparents! So, perhaps it really is true to say 'our friends are the family we choose'. What I found even more interesting in this study was that while our genes may be similar, our immune systems are quite different, which makes sense when you think about it. <sup>5</sup>\_\_\_\_ And who wants a mate who just keeps giving you their flu bugs?

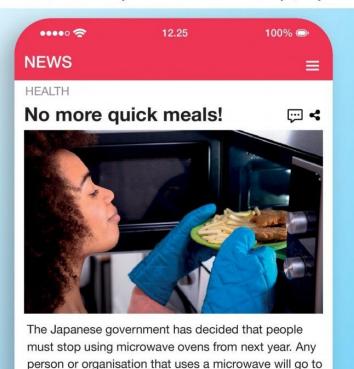

# NO MORE FAKE!

#### Online news

Fake news causes problems in all areas of life. If you don't want fake news to trick you, analyse it!

- Fake news talks more about emotions and uses adjectives like 'fantastic' and 'terrible', superlatives like 'worst' and 'most', and general nouns like 'truth' and 'freedom'. Real news uses more facts and figures.
- Find out who the author is. Google their name and if they really exist. Look at the other things they have written.
- Look for the story on other news sites. If it's real news, other organisations will cover it.

You can go to a **fact-checking** website and find out if a story is true or not.

#### **Product reviews**

Some consumer groups claim that over 50% of online product reviews might be fake! Recognising fake reviews is a challenge.

- Has the reviewer simply copied and pasted the same positive reviews for the same product?
- Has the reviewer written other reviews? If they have, are they always positive?

#### Social media

**Influencers** are popular, so brands pay them to advertise their products. Therefore, some online influencers make themselves appear more popular than they really are!

- They start new accounts, but immediately have thousands of followers. It takes years to build up a group of followers, so they can't be real.
- They follow thousands of other accounts. Nobody has the time to do that, so it must be a social web robot, or bots, that are doing the work for them.
- They form 'comment pods' with other influencers and they like and post comments on each other's social media. This is so they appear to be very active.

Some sites will check if an influencer's followers are real or fake; just type in their social media username to find out.

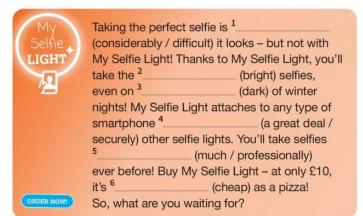

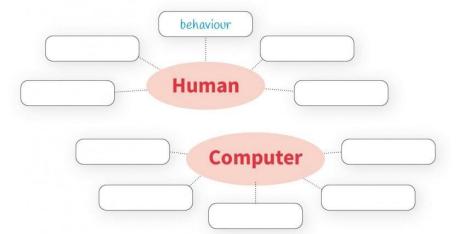

It's difficult to find good quality wireless

headphones for under £30, but the Barton X2s are comparable with the most expensive models. They are also just as stylish as some better-known brands, which makes them a perfect choice for students on a budget.

The headphones come in a bright red plastic case which you also use to charge them, and thanks to the easy-to-follow instructions, I was able to connect to my phone quickly. In fact, unlike some models from famous brands, the wireless connection is extremely reliable. The sound quality is also just as good as some top brands and the headphones fit comfortably. Furthermore, there is a convenient control button on the right side.

However, although they might be similar to other models in sound quality, they are different from them in a few areas. To begin with, in contrast to most models, the case is considerably bigger and isn't very portable. Furthermore, battery life is slightly shorter and you have to charge them after six hours of use.

On balance, the Barton X2s are great value. The sound quality and feel are identical to more expensive models and the carrying case and battery life aren't big problems. After using Barton X2 headphones for three months, I'm pleased with them and would happily recommend them to everybody.

You might not know the name Frank Abagnale, but you may have heard of Steven Spielberg's film Catch Me If You Can, which tells the story of his fascinating life. Today, Abagnale is a successful businessman who gives advice about IT security and bank fraud. However, he was once one of the most famous criminals in the USA and spent nearly five years in prison following a number of identity thefts.

Frank Abagnale was born in New York in 1948, but when his parents divorced, he went to live with his father, a businessman. Frank used to go to meetings with him and so he began to learn about the world of business. Then, as a teenager, he made money by using his father's credit card to get cash when paying at petrol stations. His father only found out when he received a bill for thousands of dollars. At the age of sixteen, Frank ran away from home with little money and without completing school. He changed his driving licence to make it seem he was ten years older, and he managed to get jobs by lying about his education.

He soon realised that if he pretended to be someone with a job that people respected, he could persuade bank staff to let him take thousands of dollars out of the bank. So he pretended to be an airline pilot. He contacted an airline company and told them that he had lost his pilot's uniform. He even used a fake identity card to charge the company for the new uniform!

He then learned as much as he could about flying and, using the name Frank Williams, he was able to travel all over the world on planes without paying. Eventually, the police began to suspect him, so he changed his name and job again. In Georgia, he pretended to be a doctor called Frank Conners, although he had no medical qualifications. For the next few years, Abagnale pretended to have a number of different jobs and made more than \$2.5 million by borrowing money from the banks. Eventually, while he was living in France, an old girlfriend saw his picture on a poster asking for information about him, and she told the police.

Abagnale spent time in prison in France, Sweden and the USA. When he left prison, the US government asked him to teach other people about the methods he had used, so that they could catch criminals like him. For more than 30 years, he worked with the FBI and became one of their leading experts. 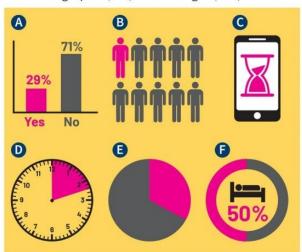

# Why we never give up

- A few years ago, research by the National Alliance for Youth Sports in the USA found that most young people (around 70%) gave up playing all organised sport by the age of thirteen. At a time when the physical and mental benefits of sport are well known, this is shocking, but not suprising.
- B According to the research, the main reason that teenagers no longer wanted to take part in any organised sport was that 'it's just not fun anymore'. When I was a child, playing sports was all about having a good time with my friends. It didn't matter if you were not the fastest and most skilful, you still joined in. It was about playing together, learning to win and lose, laughing and crying, but above all enjoying the moment. But now that we are older, sports teachers and coaches only seem to be interested in the few kids who want to take it seriously. The rest of us, who just want to play for fun, get forgotten.
- As I see it, it isn't just sport that is the problem; it's the entire culture of success that we live in. Every day we are told to 'be the best', 'give 110%' and 'never give up'. But what if you just want to do something you aren't very good at because it's fun?
- People also need to remember that life for a teenager is pretty busy. You don't want to miss out on spending time with friends and developing other interests because you're expected to go to athletics training five times a week. And let's not forget school. As we get older, we spend more and more time studying, both at home and at school.
- (E) What is really annoying about all of this is that sport is so important. Apart from all the physical benefits, there is a huge amount of research that says sport can help young people deal with problems such as stress and depression. When around 30% of teenagers suffer from stress, we need to be doing everything possible to get them to take up a sport.

Before 2002, the British team had only managed to win one Olympic gold medal in cycling in 90 years and no British cyclist had been able to win the Tour de France. But then they appointed Dave Brailsford as head coach. With the support of the whole team, Brailsford was able to introduce a theory of 'marginal gains' to the sport. This meant he tried to make very small improvements across the whole team. They looked at every part of the bikes and managed to make them lighter and faster. Then they tested the cyclists' fitness levels so they could see which ones had the ability to become winners. They changed the way the cyclists trained and they realised that being able to sleep well was extremely important, so each cyclist got a special bed to sleep on. They even employed a doctor to teach them how to wash their hands properly to avoid getting illnesses.

Were they able to improve results? Well, they didn't manage to win every cycling medal, but in the 2008, 2012 and 2016 Olympic Games, the British team won 22 cycling gold medals, and between 2012 and 2018 the Tour de France was won by a British cyclist six times. Will they be able to continue this success in the future? Will they manage to win more gold medals? Time will tell.

# Doing competitive sports is a great way to learn important lessons.

Everyone agrees that it is vital to teach some kind of sport and exercise in every school. But competitive sport can be dangerous and not everyone can succeed. Is it better to ban them or are they an important part of school life?

Most people would agree that playing in a team in a competition is positive for a teenager's physical and mental health. 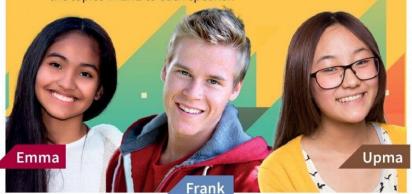

However, meat production uses a lot of the world's land: 25% of land is used by animals and another 33% is used to grow crops for them. Unsurprisingly, some people say we should eat more environmentally friendly types of 'meat'. Here we look at three options - which is your favourite?

#### **Plant-based burgers**

Some vegetarian burgers really look like red meat and also taste like it, but they are made from plants. However, 'fake' burgers aren't necessarily healthy food; some contain secret ingredients, including additives, to give them that real meat taste.



#### Lab meat

It takes eighteen months to produce the beef from a cow to make meatballs, but it only takes a few weeks to grow beef in a laboratory. Furthermore, lab meat doesn't need farmland. Plant-based burgers are being sold next to meat burgers by one of the world's most famous fast food restaurants. # How the food industry tricks us

In the past, we burned lots of calories by moving from place to place, hunting animals and collecting plants and fruit. To live like **this**, we needed lots of energy. We learned that plants and fruits contained natural sugar, gave us energy and were part of a healthy diet.

Our brains produce dopamine, the happiness chemical, when we eat something sweet. Today, this desire for sweet food is used by the food industry, and it is becoming an addiction that is causing certain diseases to reach epidemic levels.

Sugar is added to almost every food product, including 'healthy' **ones** like low-fat yoghurt and fruit juice, and **it** causes health problems. Most people know that they should give up or cut down on certain food products, but the results of food industry science studies of what happens to our brains when we eat are used to stop us from doing that. *The New York Times* reporter Michael Moss investigated the food industry and he discovered some of the tricks they use.

# A The killer ingredients

Scientists discovered that sugar together with salt is a mix that we find very hard to say no to. Fast food meals, breakfast cereals and biscuits are just some of the food products that use this 'magic' combination.

# The happiness moment

Food scientists know the exact amount of the killer ingredients that are needed to create dopamine, the feeling of happiness when we eat.

# The right feeling

The food industry creates food that tastes and feels good. They aim to produce feelings that consumers want to experience again and again.

# Taste explosion

The shape and size of pieces of food are studied so that they create a perfect taste explosion when we bite into **them**.

# No calories

Food products are designed to be eaten quickly so that our brains think that they are eating few calories. Our brains tell us to stop eating when we have enough calories, but the food industry wants us to eat more!

Now we know how the food industry uses our natural needs to make us eat its products, what can we do about it?

# Doing good on holiday



I'd just finished school and was keen to go abroad, but with little savings, I knew it would be difficult. But then a friend of mine sent me a link to the SCI (Service Civil International) website and suggested I check it out. Six weeks later, I was volunteering at a community centre which was helping street kids in Tirana, Albania. It turned out to be one of the best decisions I have made.

SCI is a global volunteering organisation that organises 'camps' in 43 countries. It was set up in Switzerland after the First World War by Pierre Cérésole. He was an engineer who had seen the horrors of war and was determined to bring young people from different countries together in an atmosphere of peace and understanding. The first camp he organised, which included volunteers from France and Germany, helped to rebuild a village destroyed in the war.

These days, SCI has hundreds of projects that need enthusiastic, friendly and fun volunteers. These include preparing food at a restaurant for the homeless in Vietnam, helping disabled children at a summer camp in Russia or organising a music festival for young people in Croatia.

At my camp, there were eight volunteers whose ages went from 18 to 25, and were from Spain, Portugal, Mexico, Poland, Japan and, of course, Albania. We all stayed in a community centre and we didn't have to pay for accommodation or meals, and this happens in most camps.

Every day, about 20 children turned up at the centre. These were kids whose families lived in dangerous houses on the edge of the city often without electricity or fresh water. We played games together, helped them with English, sang songs and one day we even cooked some traditional food from our countries. The kids were great. They were so friendly, curious and full of life.

In the evenings, we were free to explore the area and see the sights of Tirana. It's a city which has got plenty to offer. But when I look back, what I liked best was the chance we had to meet local people and learn about their country. And I'll never forget the party the local volunteers organised for us on our last night there.

The two weeks I had volunteering with SCI in Albania gave me the chance to pick up new skills, make new friends and, most importantly, make a decision about what I wanted to do with my future. Let's face it, there's no way I would have got any of that if I had just stayed at a beach resort with my friends for two weeks.

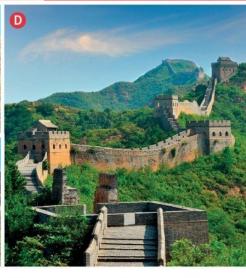

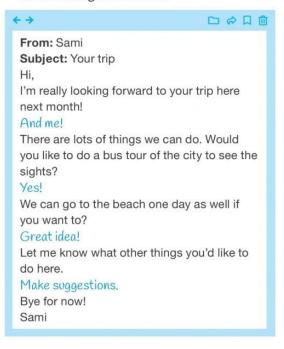

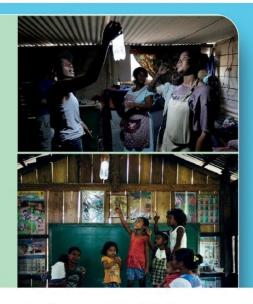

has turned thousands of used one-litre plastic drinks bottles into lights! In one of their YouTube videos, they said that 1.5 billion people in the world had no access to electric light. One of the videos was from the Philippines – <sup>1</sup>the presenter explained that many

of the people lived in poverty there and that their houses didn't have any windows. However, the video presenter said that a plastic bottle could provide light. How? ### Yash Gupta

There are 13 million children in the world who go to school every day and can't focus on the blackboard. Why? Because their families can't afford to buy them glasses. When teenager Yash Gupta broke his glasses, he discovered how difficult life could be without them. Yash spent a week waiting for new glasses and he said he couldn't see anything in the classroom at all. It was during that week that he learned about all the children around the world who needed glasses. So, at just fourteen, Yash launched a campaign to collect used glasses and send them to school students all over the world. Since then, his organisation, Sight Learning, has provided 60,000 pairs of glasses to grateful school students, giving them the chance to make the most of their education.

# Caragan Olles

A lot of young children find the first day at school a stressful event, but for Caragan Olles every day was stressful. Teachers told her she was lazy, and couldn't understand why she found school difficult. Then when she was nine, Caragan was told she had dyslexia. People with dyslexia encounter problems learning to read and understand the meaning of words, letters and other symbols. Getting help was expensive, but Caragan realised that she wasn't the only student with dyslexia, so at the age of ten she set up a charity, Bright Young Dyslexics. Thanks to donations and Caragan's hard work and fundraising, Bright Young Dyslexics has now helped over 2,500 young people overcome the difficulties presented by the condition. Today, sixteen-year-old Caragan continues to organise campaigns to bring about change in the way society deals with dyslexia.

# THE BRONZE AGE (3000 BCE-1200 BCE)

All young teenagers were expected to work long hours for their families, and they carried out duties such as looking after animals and collecting fruit, plants and firewood. Young teenage girls from important families wore beautiful jewellery and were sent to other regions to marry, so their parents could make political connections.

# THE ROMAN EMPIRE (27 BCE-393 CE)

Teenagers from poor families worked in the houses of the rich, and the teenagers from rich homes were expected to develop skills that would help their families. Boys did apprenticeships for different jobs while the girls worked indoors with their mothers.

# THE MEDIEVAL AGE (476-1453 CE)

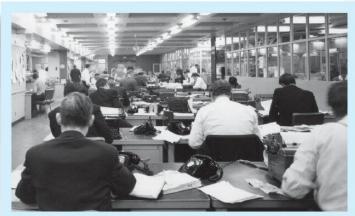
When children reached the age of nine, they were sent to other people's houses to live and do chores. Parents believed they were helping their children by sending them away to work and save money so they could do an apprenticeship later.

# THE 20TH CENTURY (1901-2000)

Many countries became richer and there was more money for education. As a result, all young people had to go to school until fourteen or sixteen. Some teenagers had part-time jobs, but very few worked full-time. Parents also spent money on their teenage children and they became a new target for the fashion and entertainment industries.

Imagine investing all your savings in something you don't understand, can't see, touch or hold in your hands. It sounds crazy. But that's what millions of people decided to do in the 2010s.

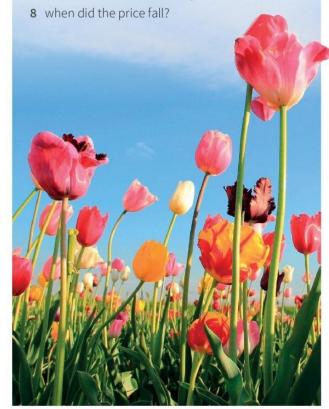

# How advertising hacks into our needs



In 1943, psychologist Abraham Maslow wrote about the needs that all humans have. As well as the simple things we need to survive such as food, water, safety and a place to live, he found a number of psychological and emotional needs: to belong, to feel included and part of something and to have friends, love, success and respect. Advertisers have used these ideas to help to sell their products and services.

# Keep it emotional

When you're selling a product that everyone uses, you need more than facts to sell your brand. All shampoos do the same thing: they clean your hair. So, how do advertisers convince us to buy their shampoo? They meet our emotional needs. This might be the need to feel attractive, valued, in control or confident.

# Follow the crowd

We like to be part of a group to feel safe, liked and respected and we often follow what other people are doing. Advertisers try to exploit this by claiming that a product is already popular and part of most people's lives. If lots of people have already decided to do something, we will feel more confident about making the same decision. This is often used by companies that are launching new technology. Mobile phones only became popular after huge advertising campaigns had convinced people that they were already popular.

## **FOMO** (Fear of Missing Out)

It is a basic human emotion not to want to miss out on something. That's why advertisers often tell you to 'buy now while stocks last' or give you a limited time to buy something. The popularity of the Black Friday sales is a good example here. If people hadn't seen news stories about people fighting to find a good offer, it's unlikely that millions more would have joined the queues. Some companies also produce fewer products than they can sell to create excitement and fear as people try to get their hands on them.

# Only for the rich

If you tell someone they can't have something, they will want it more. Luxury brands know this, so they rarely give discounts or have sales. But by keeping their products very exclusive, people want the products much more and only those with a high status can afford them.

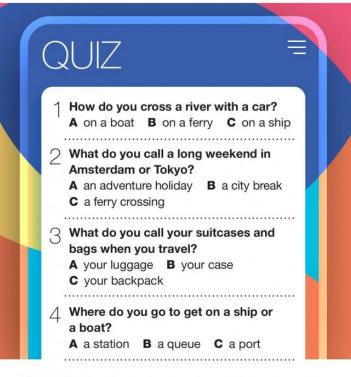

We use the present simple to talk about our everyday lives and things we do regularly.

Omar goes to school from Monday to Friday. He doesn't go to school at the weekend.

We also use the present simple to talk about how we think or feel about something.

I enjoy maths. She doesn't like doing sport.

We form the present simple affirmative with subject + verb. The spelling changes for he / she / it forms. With most verbs, we add -s.

We add -es to verbs ending in -o, -s, -x, -z, -ch and -sh.

We change -y to -ies after a consonant.

## Present continuous

We use the present continuous to talk about things that are happening now.

'What are you doing, Alex? Are you playing computer games?' 'No, I'm not! I'm doing my homework.'

We also use the present continuous to talk about things that are happening around now (today, this week, etc.).

We aren't going to school this week. We're on holiday.

We form the present continuous affirmative with subject + be + -ing form.

I'm / You're / We're / They're having lunch. He's / She's / It's having lunch.

We form the present continuous negative with subject + be + not + -ing form.

I'm not having lunch.

You / We / They aren't having lunch.

He / She / It isn't having lunch.

We form yes/no questions with be + subject + -ing form +? Notice the short answers:

Am I having lunch? Yes, I am. Are you / we / they having lunch? Yes, we are. Is he / she / it having lunch? No, she isn't.

Notice the spelling for the -ing form of the verb: With most verbs, we add + ing: watch = watching. For verbs ending in -e, we change -e to -ing: ride = riding. With verbs that end in vowel + consonant (not w, x or y), we double the consonant + -ing: run = running.

## Dynamic and state verbs

Dynamic verbs describe actions and we can use them in the simple or continuous form. State verbs describe states or situations and we don't usually use them in continuous tenses.

Some common state verbs are believe, belong, hate, know, like, love, mean, need, prefer, remember, understand, want.

Some verbs can be state or dynamic.

Dynamic: What are you thinking about? (mental activity)

State: What do you think of the book? (opinion)

Dynamic: Are you having a good time? (experience)

State: Do you have a car? (own)

#### Countable nouns

Countable nouns are things that we can count. They have singular and plural forms.

We use a / an before singular nouns when we talk about something for the first time. We use a when the noun starts with a consonant sound.

We use *an* when a noun or the next word starts with a vowel sound:

My brother is now an uncle.

My gran is an elderly woman.

We use *the* when we mention something for the second time or when we talk about specific things.

I've got a book about the different stages of life. The book is really helpful and interesting.

We don't use an article before plural nouns when we talk about things in general.

I love books. I really like stories about families.

#### 0.3 Zero conditional

We use the zero conditional to talk about causes and results that are always true.

I can't study if it's noisy.

We form the zero conditional like this:

<i>If</i> clause		Result clause
If	Subject + present simple	Subject + present simple
If	plants don't get water,	they die.

In zero conditional sentences, we can use *when* instead of *if*. When it rains, we play basketball indoors.

We usually put the *if* clause before the result clause. We use a comma after the *if* clause:

If I study hard, I get good results.

We can put the result clause before the *if* clause when the result is important. We don't use a comma after the result clause.

I get good results if I study hard.

#### First conditional

We use the first conditional to talk about possible events and their results.

If I get a job, I'll move into my own apartment.

We form the first conditional like this:

If c	lause	Result clause

If	you run,	you won't	miss the bus.
If	it doesn't rain	we'll	go to the beach tomorrow.

We can use *unless* in conditional sentences. *Unless* means except if.

He won't know your name <u>unless</u> you tell him. I won't need an umbrella unless it rains.

#### Second conditional

We use the second conditional to talk about situations that are not real or are unlikely. We use it when we imagine events and their results.

If I did a bungee jump, I'd be very nervous!

We form the second conditional like this:

If	you went to bed earlier,	you wouldn't	feel tired all the time.

After subject pronouns, we usually use the short form 'd instead of would.

#### If I had lots of money, I'd travel around the world.

We can put the *if* clause or the result clause first. When the *if* clause comes before the result clause, we put a comma after it.

If you opened a bank account, you'd save more money. You'd save more money if you opened a bank account.

In *if* clauses, we can use *was* or *were* after *I / he / she / it*. *Were* is more formal.

Informal: If I was eighteen, I'd get a credit card. Formal: If I were eighteen, I'd get a credit card.

#### Have to / don't have to

We use *have to* to talk about things that are necessary.

I have to make my bed every day.

We use *don't have to* to say that it isn't necessary to do something.

I don't have to make my breakfast. I get it at school.

#### TIP

## Need to / don't need to

We can use *need to* when we talk about obligation at a specific time.

I need to start my history project today, but I don't need to finish it until next week.

We use don't need to to say that something isn't necessary.

#### Must / mustn't

We use *must* to say that something is essential and we use *mustn't* to say it is essential that we don't do something.

We use *must* and *mustn't* for rules and when we feel it's very important to do something.

Subject	must	Verb

#### TIP

- 1 We don't use to after must / mustn't.
  You mustn't eat in the classroom.

#### 1.2 Narrative tenses

We use the past simple to talk about completed actions in the past.

#### I cycled to school yesterday.

We use the past continuous to talk about an action in progress in the past.

#### I was cycling to school yesterday at 8 a.m.

When we use these tenses together, we use the past continuous for the longer, continuous action and the past simple for the short, completed action.

#### I was cycling to school yesterday when I saw my teacher.

We use the past perfect to talk about an action that happened or finished before another action in the past.

#### When I took my phone out of my bag, the cute dog had gone.

We can use *when* and *while* to link two actions in the past. We often use *when* with the past simple and *while* with the past continuous.

I was walking in the park when I saw the cutest dog. I saw the cutest dog while I was walking in the park.

#### TIP

We use the past perfect when we need to make the order of actions clear. With time adverbs like *before* and *after*, the order of actions is already clear so the past perfect is optional.

The exam (had) started before we arrived.

We arrived after the exam (had) started.

When an action directly follows after another action in the past, the past simple is often used.

When I arrived late, I apologised to the teacher.

We form the past continuous like this:

We don't use *used to* when the action only happened once. One day, I rode my bike to the beach.

(NOT One day, I used to ride my bike to the beach. X)

## 2.2 Present perfect and past simple

We use the past simple to talk about a completed action in the past. We often use a time expression to say when the event happened.

#### We won the match yesterday.

We use the present perfect to talk about actions or events in the past when we don't know the exact time or it isn't important.

#### We've won a lot of matches.

We use the present perfect with *for* to talk about a period of time, or with *since* to say when a situation started. We use *How long . . . ?* to ask questions about the length of time an action occurred.

How long have you played basketball? I've played basketball for five years.

We've played basketball since 2015.

We can also use general time expressions, such as *recently*, before and in my life.

We've had a lot of homework recently.

I've been to Mexico before.

I've made a lot of great friends in my life.

We often use the present perfect with *ever* to start a conversation about our experiences. If we want to ask about details or give more information, we use the past simple.

'Have you ever visited Canada?'

'Yes, I have. I went to Canada with my parents last summer.'

We use *yet* in negative sentences and questions. We put it at the end of the sentence or question.

'Have you tidied your room yet?'

'No, I haven't done it yet.'

We use *still* to talk about events that we expected to finish earlier. We put *still* in negative sentences before *haven't / hasn't*.

We can use the present perfect simple and the present perfect continuous to describe past events that have a direct link to the present.

I've just finished the test.

I've been working on the test all morning.

We use the present perfect simple ...

- with ever and never to ask and talk about past experiences.
   'Have you ever studied Spanish?'
  - 'No, I've never studied Spanish.'
- to talk about actions that finished recently, especially when we're focusing on the result.

I've made a cake. Would you like some?

- to say how many times we have done something.
   I've been to the United States three times.
- with state verbs like *love*, *be* and *have*: We've had our car for six months.

We use the present perfect continuous ...

- to emphasise the duration of an action.
   'What have you been doing since I last saw you?'
   'I've been attending classes at university for two years.'
- for actions which have recently finished, but with the focus on the activity or the evidence of a recent activity.

'You look exhausted. What have you been doing?'

'I've been running!'

We don't use the present perfect continuous with verbs that describe states and not actions, like be, have, know, believe.

How long have you known them?

(NOT How long have you been knowing them?)

We can use must, can't, could, may (not) and might (not) to guess if something in the present is true or not based on information we have.

We use must + verb to say that something is certainly true or that it seems the most likely possibility.

Darius must be rich because he goes on holiday six times a year.

We use *can't* + verb to say that something is certainly not true. They can't be Australian because they don't understand

We use *could / may / might* + verb to say that something is possibly true.

'What's that noise?'

'It could be the wind. / It might be an animal. / It may be my brother.'

We use may not / might not + verb to say that something is possibly not true.

It might not be the wind. / It may not be an animal.

#### TIP

We don't use can, couldn't or mustn't to make deductions in

It may / might be fake news. NOT It can be fake news. X It can't be fake news.

NOT It mustn't be fake news. X

NOT It couldn't be fake news. X

## 3.6 Comparatives and superlatives

We use comparative adjectives to compare things, places or people. We use superlative adjectives to compare one thing, person or place with the whole group.

My brother is taller than me. My brother is the tallest student in his class.

We form comparative and superlative adjectives like this:

Type of adjective	Comparative form	Superlative form
Adjectives with one syllable	Add -er: nice → nicer big → bigger	Add the + -est: nice → the nicest big → the biggest
Adjectives with two syllables ending in -y	Remove <i>y</i> and add -ier easy → easier	Remove <i>y</i> and add <i>the</i> + - <i>iest</i> easy → the easiest
Adjectives with two syllables or more	Put more / less before the adjective: expensive > more / less expensive	Put the most / the least before the adjective: expensive  the most / least expensive
Irregular adjective forms	good → better bad → worse	good → the best bad → the worst

We can use as + adjective + as to compare things that are similar.

I'm as tall as my sister. (= We're the same height.)

We can use not as + adjective + as to make negative comparisons.

I'm not as tall as my brother. (= I'm shorter than my brother.)

We use comparative adverbs to compare actions.

Khalid did the test more accurately than Joe.

We use superlative adverbs to compare one action to all others.

He runs the fastest.

Type of adverb	Comparative form	Superlative form
Adverbs ending in -ly	Put <i>more</i> before the adverb slowly → more slowly	Put <i>the most</i> before the adverb slowly → the most slowly
Other adverbs	Add -er hard → harder	Add the + -est hard → the hardest

We normally use *than* after comparative adjectives and adverbs when we compare one thing to another.

My new shoes are more comfortable than my old ones.

Louise works harder than her sister.

We use these modifying adverbs to mean that there is only a small difference: a bit, slightly, a little.

She sings a bit better than me. She sings slightly better than me. She sings a little better than me.

We use these modifying adverbs to mean that there is a big difference: *much*, *far*, *a lot*.

He's much quicker than me. He's far quicker than me. He's a lot quicker than me.

## 4.2 Quantifiers

We use quantifiers before countable and uncountable nouns to show *how many* or *how much*.

Countable nouns are things that we can count. They have singular and plural forms. We use *a* or *an* with singular countable nouns.

#### There's an exercise machine. There are three machines.

Uncountable nouns are always singular. We don't use *a*, *an* or numbers with uncountable nouns.

#### There's some information about the gym schedule.

Use these quantifiers with countable and uncountable nouns.

+ Singular countable noun	+ Uncountable noun	+ Plural noun

We use *a few* and *a little* for small amounts. We use *a few* with countable nouns, and *a little* with uncountable nouns.

#### I have a few minutes.

#### There's a little time before class.

When we use *few* or *little*, this means we have less than we would like.

#### Few people get the exercise that they need.

#### There's little time in their lives.

We use much and many to mean 'a lot of'.

We use *much* with uncountable nouns. We use *many* with plural countable nouns.

#### I don't have much time to exercise.

#### Many people go to the gym.

We can use *most* with plural nouns or uncountable nouns to mean *nearly all*.

#### Most students go to the gym.

#### Most exercise clothing is expensive.

We use *all* with plural countable nouns or uncountable nouns to refer to a whole group.

#### All the students passed the test.

We use *each* and *every* with singular countable nouns to mean *all*. We use *every* to talk about all the things, people, etc. in a group. We use *each* when we refer to all the things, people, etc. in a group, but considered individually.

#### Each day I get up at 7 a.m.

#### Every day I get up at 7 a.m.

Both refers to two things or people when only two are involved.

#### Both Kelly and Grace passed the test.

Several refers to more than two, but not all.

#### Several students passed the test.

We use *no* in positive sentences and *any* in negative sentences to mean none or zero.

#### There are no pastries left.

There aren't any cookies left.

We often use a quantifier before words like *his*, *my*, *the*, *these* + noun.

#### Some of these fitness trackers use your data.

We never use of after every or no. We use everyone and none:

#### None of my friends uses a fitness tracker.

We use can, can't and am / is / are able to to talk about ability in the present.

#### Ability in the past

To talk about general ability in the past, we use *could* (*not*). We could speak Spanish when we were at primary school.

To talk about ability in a particular situation in the past, we use was / were able to.

The river was deep, but we were able to cross it.

To talk about a particular achievement in the past that needed a lot of effort, we use *managed to*.

He managed to win the championship.

To talk about lack of ability in a particular situation in the past, we can use *couldn't*, *wasn't* / *weren't* able to or *didn't* manage to.

I couldn't / wasn't able to / didn't manage to climb the mountain because it was too hard.

We form sentences with *could* with subject + *could* / *couldn't* + verb. *Could* and *couldn't* are the same for all subjects (*l*, *you*, *he*, etc.).

We can use the present simple, the present continuous, be going to and will to talk about the future.

We can use the present simple when the future event is part of a fixed schedule or timetable.

#### The race begins at 7.30 a.m.

We can use the present continuous to talk about future events that have already been planned and arranged.

#### I'm running a race tomorrow!

We can use be going to to talk about future intentions or for making predictions based on evidence.

#### I'm going to eat lunch after the race.

We can use will to make predictions without evidence, to show that something is a spontaneous decision or to offer

It'll be an exciting day!

I'll have the chicken salad.

I'll get you a new shirt when I go to the shop.

We use the passive when we want to focus on an action rather than the person or the thing that caused the action, or if we don't know who did it.

The photo was taken by a famous photographer. It won several prizes.

We form the passive with the correct form of the verb *be* and the past participle. We use the passive infinitive (*be* + past participle) after modal verbs.

## 6.2 Defining relative clauses

We use defining relative clauses with the relative pronouns that, which, who, when, where and whose to identify the specific person or thing that we are talking about.

This is the backpacking tour that got such great online reviews.

We use who or that to introduce a defining relative clause about people. That is more informal.

#### Can you describe the man who / that stole your bag?

We use which or that to introduce a defining relative clause about things. That is more common.

France is the country which / that has the highest number of tourists.

We use where to introduce a defining relative clause about place.

#### That's the restaurant where we ate last night.

We use when to introduce a defining relative clause about time.

#### 1992 was the year when my parents got married.

We use whose to introduce a defining relative clause about possession.

#### She's the person whose car we bought.

Defining relative clauses follow the nouns that they define and are not separated from the main clause of the sentence by any punctuation.

We can omit *who*, *which* and *that* from a defining relative clause when they refer to the object of the clause.

#### Those are the people (who) we met on holiday.

But we can't omit the relative pronoun when they refer to the subject.

That is the woman who sat next to me on the plane. (= She sat next to me on the plane.)

NOT That is the woman sat next to me on the plane. X

We use non-defining relative clauses with the relative pronouns *which*, *where*, *who* and *whose* to give extra information about the person or thing that we are talking about.

My uncle, who was a famous explorer, travelled all over the world.

I went surfing yesterday, which was a new experience for me. Last year we went to Paris, where we stayed in a flat near the centre.

That woman, whose sister I was at school with, is a famous artist.

A non-defining relative clause follows the noun that it is describing, and is separated from the main clause of the sentence by commas.

We can never omit the relative pronoun in a non-defining relative clause, even when it refers to the object of the clause.

My brother, who you met last weekend, has just got a new job.

NOT My brother, you met last weekend, has just got a new job. X

# 7.2 Reported speech

We use reported speech to talk about what someone said. We often use the verbs *say* or *tell* to introduce reported statements.

'The weather is nice.'

She said (that) the weather was nice.

She told me (that) the weather was nice.

When we change direct speech to reported speech, we usually change the verb and go one tense back. The past perfect doesn't change in reported speech.

#### TIP

We always use an indirect object after *tell*. We do not use an indirect object after *say*.

He told us he could speak three languages.

He said he could speak three languages.

(NOT He said us he could speak three languages. X)

We can use or omit that in reported sentences.

He said he felt ill. = He said that he felt ill.

The modal verbs *can*, *may*, *must* and *have to* usually change form, but the auxiliary verbs *might*, *could*, *should* and *ought to* don't usually change form.

'We can't raise taxes again,' said the president.

The president said we couldn't raise taxes again.

'More people ought to volunteer,' said the mayor.

The mayor said that more people ought to volunteer.

Pronouns and possessive adjectives often have to change in reported speech. We also sometimes need to change references to time and place.

Fatima: 'I'm taking my project home with me tomorrow.'
Fatima said that she was taking her project home with her the following day.

# 7.6 Reported questions

When we want to say what someone has asked, we change direct questions to reported questions. The verb form usually moves back one tense.

'Do you like pizza?'

He asked me if I liked pizza.

We usually use the reporting verb *ask* to report what someone has asked. In *yes/no* questions, we add *if* or *whether*:

'Do you want a cup of tea, Joe?'

Mum asked Joe if he wanted a cup of tea.

Mum asked Joe whether he wanted a cup of tea.

To form reported questions with question words, we must repeat the question word. We use the structure (somebody) asked (me / him / them, etc.) + question word (where, what, how, etc.).

We don't use auxiliary verbs like *do* or *did* in reported questions. The word order is the same as in statements.

'Where do you live?'

She asked me where I lived.

(NOT She asked me where did Hive.)

'How are you going to pay for it?'

She asked me how I was going to pay for it.

(NOT She asked me how was I going to pay for it.)

We can use ask with or without a direct object.

She asked where the bus station was.

She asked us where the bus station was.

In reported questions, we have to make the same changes to pronouns, possessive adjectives and time or place phrases as we do in reported statements.

'Where were you yesterday?'

#### 8.2 Third conditional

We use the third conditional to talk about imaginary situations in the past and their imaginary results.

If we'd seen you, we would have given you a lift.

(= but we didn't see you so we didn't give you a lift.)

We often use the third conditional to express regret or criticism.

If I'd driven more slowly, I wouldn't have had an accident.

The third conditional is made of an *if* clause and a result clause.

If c	lause	Result clause

Notice the short forms of both had and would is 'd:

If I'd had more time, I'd have stopped for petrol.

However, in written English, we don't usually shorten both forms:

If you'd worked harder, you would have passed your exams.

In spoken English, we often shorten both *would* and *have* in the main clause.

We can put the *if* clause or the result clause first. We put a comma after the *if* clause when it comes before the result clause. When the result clause comes first, we do not add a comma.

If you'd come with us, you would have had a good time. You would have had a good time if you'd come with us.

If we are talking about imaginary ability or possibility, we can use *could* instead of *would* in the result clause.

If I'd known about the study session, I could have gone to it.

Sometimes when one verb comes after another in a sentence, the second verb will follow a pattern depending on what the first verb is.

We decided to go shopping.

I decided to buy a new bag.

I enjoy shopping online.

I enjoy finding the best bargain.

Some verbs are followed by to + infinitive. These verbs include: aim, choose, happen, promise, decide, need, offer, learn and want.

They chose to advertise online.

We happen to live next door.

They promised to lower the prices.

They decided to sell things online.

They need to advertise better.

He offered to lend me some money.

She learned not to spend her money on branded clothes.

They want to be better at marketing.

Some verbs are followed by the *-ing* form. These verbs include: *enjoy*, *fancy*, *keep*, *imagine* and *avoid*.

Imagine winning the lottery!

#### TIP

Some verbs that are followed by an infinitive can also be followed by the -ing form. These verbs include like, dislike, love, prefer and try with little or no change in meaning. The company likes to advertise online.

Customers dislike seeing advertisements.

Some verbs are followed by a noun or pronoun + to + infinitive. These verbs include ask, invite, convince, tell and help.

Arthur Conan Doyle was a Scottish writer. He was born in Scotland in 1859. He studied medicine at university, and after graduating, he began his career as a doctor. However, his first love was writing, and in 1891, he left medicine, and started earning a living from writing books and stories.

By 1887 Conan Doyle had already published *A Study in Scarlet*, the first of many mystery stories and novels about a detective called Sherlock Holmes. His medical training helped his writing, and one of his professors at university, Dr Joseph Bell, helped form the character of Sherlock Holmes. Bell's careful attention to detail and talent for discovering the causes of problems became an important part of Sherlock Holmes' personality. However, the detective is also very messy and his mood can change very quickly, which is sometimes confusing for the people around him! However, he is never without his reliable assistant, Dr Watson, and together they travel around Britain and Europe, solving mysteries and catching criminals.

The Sherlock Holmes stories and novels became incredibly popular. However, the success of the fictional detective didn't make Conan Doyle happy. He also wrote historical and science fiction novels, which he thought were more important. In 1893, Conan Doyle published the story *The Final Problem* about Sherlock Holmes' death. However, the British public was so upset about the end of Holmes' adventures that Conan Doyle later went back to writing Sherlock Holmes stories again.

Arthur Conan Doyle died in 1930. Although his historical and science fiction novels are not well known, Sherlock Holmes is now one of the most famous characters in British fiction.

Since the first Holmes book was published in 1887, there have been hundreds of films, plays

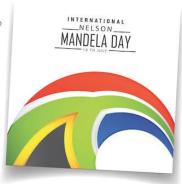

#### **EARLY DAYS**

- The BBC began broadcasting daily on the radio from 14 November 1922. This included the international radio station BBC World Service.
- The BBC Television Service officially launched on 2 November 1936. It offered news, sport, drama, and children's shows.
- Some important live events were shown on TV, for example, the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II in 1952 and the Apollo Moon landing in 1969.

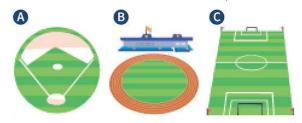

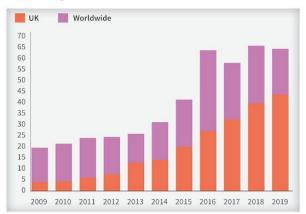

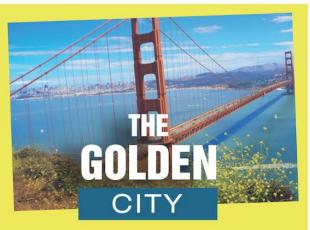

- Many of us are familiar with San Francisco, a city in California, USA. Images of its Golden Gate Bridge, and its beautiful streets are often seen on TV and in films. But did you know that San Francisco is one of the most multicultural cities in the world? Over 30% of its population was born outside the country?
- San Francisco's largest foreign community is from China. The Chinese arrived in the 1840s, when gold was discovered in California! The Chinese community is the largest outside Asia, and San Francisco's Chinatown is the oldest Chinese neighbourhood in North America. - The city's Russian population arrived in the 1920s and again in the 1990s, after big political changes in their own country. - The first Italian immigrants also came in search of gold, and they are the biggest European community in San Francisco today. - The Fillmore District is home to San Francisco's African-American community. In the 1940s, many came to the San Francisco area to work at the port, taking goods on and off ships. It is well known for its jazz clubs, where stars such as Charlie Parker and Billie Holiday performed. But you can also experience African-American culture in its bookshops, its church singing, and its restaurants.
- California was under Mexican control until 1848, when it became part of the USA. At this point, all Mexicans living there became American citizens. The Mission District is the Spanish-speaking heart of the city. On 5th May, you can experience the Cinco de Mayo celebrations, an annual party with Mexican and Latino music, food and dancing!

Every spring and autumn, climbers queue at the top of Mount Everest, all hoping to spend a few minutes at the top of the world. Since the 1950s, this challenge has become extremely popular, and it all started because of a climber from New Zealand, called Edmund Hillary.

In New Zealand, Hillary is considered a national hero. His face even appears on the country's five dollar



note. Although he did many great things in his life, his greatest <sup>1</sup>\_ are perhaps what he did for the people of Nepal.

On these trips, Sir Edmund asked local people how he could help them. 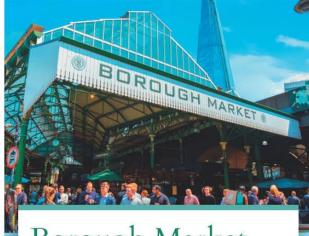

# Borough Market

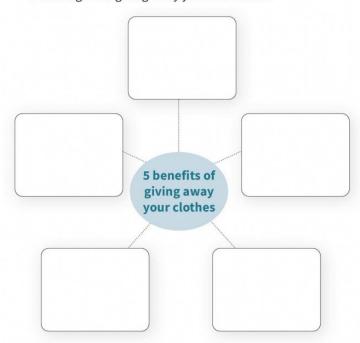
